Any one interested in this idea? If so, let me know your thoughts and what you're willing to do.

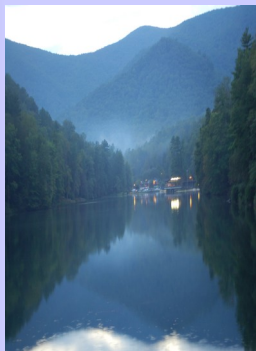

Last Summer participants in a

GFW group snorkeled on the Chattooga River inside the Chattahoochee National Forest. The water there is pristine because it's protected by inclusion in the huge National Forest Lands against runoff from farms, erosion deposits caused by clear cutting of the forest and, as a result, contains more species of aquatic life than in the watersheds of Northern California and Oregon

combined! Also, the water is clear which makes for great snorkeling !

***The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks*, Rebecca Skoot, 2010**

Henrietta Lacks was a poor, African American tobacco farm worker in Virginia in the 1940's. While undergoing treatment for cervical cancer at John Hopkins University Hospital in 1951, doctors and lab technicians discovered that Henrietta's tumor cells were extraordinary as they would continuously reproduce long after being removed from her body. Henrietta had multiple samples removed from her body, without her knowledge or consent.

While her descendants cannot even afford health care, her cells (which have been named "HeLa Cells") have been reproduced billions of times and led to the establishment of biological research around the world, that had never been possible. Her cells have been reproduced so much that the combined weight of all the cells would exceed 50 million metric tons. They have been used in everything from developing the first Polio vaccine to cloning and in vitro fertilization.

The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skoot -2010 looks at the fascinating story of Henrietta as well as the "life" of her HeLa cells. It discusses the ethical questions around medical research – the unanswered questions that are just as pertinent today as they were in 1951.

Disability Recognition Day

Unlock the Doors to Real Communities! Is the theme for the Georgia Council On Developmental Disabilities (GCDD) **13th Annual Disability Day at the Capitol** that invites people with disabilities, family members, policy makers, business leaders and providers to gather at the Capitol in celebration of community, advocacy, friendship, and achievement? In 2010, nearly 2,000 Georgians attended the public rally on the steps of the State Capitol in a powerful show of support for disability rights. In 2011, Disability Day attendance is expected to grow, strengthening its presence and position among the largest events on record held annually during the official legislative session. 2011 also marks the 40th anniversary of the historic Developmental Disabilities Bill of Rights Act of 1971 and the creation of agencies such as GCDD throughout the US.
